The 2009 World Transplant Games is the first global sporting event to use technology running Microsoft's new desktop operating system – Windows 7.

According to Data#3's Microsoft Practice Manager, Scott Gosling, "Windows 7 has enabled us to deliver a stable, secure and reliable environment for games volunteers to work with."

"Simple improvements in Windows 7 - for example power management and the resulting increase in laptop battery life - mean that volunteers are able to extend the time they are away from a power source – critical in a sporting event such as the World Transplant Games."

As part of the sponsorship of the games, Data#3's Managed Services team has supplied critical IT infrastructure such as desktops, laptops, printers and network equipment to support games volunteers to coordinate events and distribute results, as well as enabling athletes to communicate with their families and friends around the world.

Complementing the infrastructure, Data#3 has also deployed a wireless network to cover the main event venues, and will provide on-site and remote managed services to support the games throughout the nine days of competition.

This ensures they get maximum benefit from the available technology whilst focusing on contributing at their absolute best."

Further to its support as the technology provider for the games, Data#3 recently brought together customers and technology vendors (including Microsoft, Cisco and HP) to raise \$37 000 for Team Life Transplant Australia at the 2009 Data#3 Charity Golf Day.

Staged by the World Transplant Games Federation, the Games promote physical activity and improved health among participants. Perhaps equally as important, the Games provide a network to make new friends across borders, people who have experienced similar circumstances. The summer Games are held biennially and have been in existence since 1978. A Winter Games is held in the intervening year.

The Games embrace all ages, from four years to 85 years young, and all participants have received a solid organ transplant or bone marrow transplant at least one year prior, and are in good health. There are fourteen sports to choose from including track and field, swimming, cycling, ten-pin bowling, golf, tennis and badminton to name a few

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
